The Henley Beach Police Station provides for a replacement facility for the original Station constructed on the site in 1962. It accommodates the police operations in adaptable, light filled, energy efficient environments, enabling future growth and flexibility in how the facility is used, both now and into the future.

A palate of contemporary beachside materials, including over 100 year old recycled jetty timbers from the Moonta Bay Jetty, and patterned precast concrete create an engaging facade while still providing the security and durability required for those using and visiting the station.

The mid-century form, reminiscent of much of Adelaide's beachside architecture, is simple in its nature, yet promotes the image of a modern, contemporary and accessible police force.

The Riverland Oral Health Centre is a 10-chair dental clinic with support spaces for administration, teaching spaces for students of the Dental School, and a central sterilisation room.

The design delivers a sense of openness, enhanced by natural light, high ceilings, and large circulation spaces. Colourful and textured interior finishes minimise the “clinical” feel of the facility, while maintaining its clinical function. As part of the region’s health precinct, the Centre complements as well as carefully contrasts the neighbouring Riverland General Hospital site. In addition, the building’s form and materiality reflects and gracefully connects with the surrounding residential neighbourhood.
